Dear Parent/Carer

In October 2017 a team of inspectors from Education Scotland visited McLaren High School. During our visit, we talked to parents/carers and young people and worked closely with the headteacher and staff.

The inspection team found the following strengths in the school's work.

- Caring and supportive relationships across the school support a climate of mutual respect and a purposeful learning environment. This is underpinned by the school's values of 'order, respect, care, achievement'. The revised house structure is enhancing young people's sense of belonging and improving communication and involvement with families.
- Teachers work well with their colleagues to develop their practices and improve outcomes for young people. As a result, young people's learning experiences are enhanced by an improving range of approaches to learning and teaching.
- Young people are attaining well in National Qualifications. There are a commendable number of courses leading to Advanced Higher. Collaborative working with parents and partners is resulting in achievement of a range of National Qualifications for young people requiring additional support with their learning.
- The school is developing an innovative approach to raising attainment in science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM). Young people are enthusiastically undertaking STEM projects in their own time. They are developing key skills and enhancing their knowledge of potential future careers in STEM industries.

The following areas for improvement were identified and discussed with the headteacher and a representative from Stirling Council.

- A stronger strategic approach to leading and managing change is needed. Planning for improvement requires better use of the wide range of available evidence to inform the changes needed to improve the achievements of all young people.
- The school should continue to develop approaches to assessment, tracking and monitoring across the stages. This should support young people to understand their strengths, identify next steps in learning and enable staff to provide appropriate and timely interventions.
- Staff should continue to work with colleagues from across the learning community to further improve their shared understanding of assessment of Curriculum for Excellence levels.



We gathered evidence to enable us to evaluate some quality indicators from How good is our school? (4th edition). Quality indicators help schools, education authorities and inspectors to judge what is working well and what needs to be improved. Following the inspection of each school, the Scottish Government gathers evaluations of quality indicators to keep track of how well Scottish schools are doing.
